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nicole r fleetwood explores how blackness is seen as a troubling presence in the field of vision and the black body is persistently seen as a problem she examines a wide range of materials from visual and media art documentary photography theatre performance and more

in on racial icons nicole r fleetwood focuses a sustained look on photography in documenting black public life exploring the ways in which iconic images function as celebrations of national and racial progress at times or as a gauge of collective racial wounds in moments of crisis

this interdisciplinary study sees press photographs of the blm movement in the us as agents for black liberation close reading both the images and theoretical considerations on blackness photography and the often intangible articulations of racism in today s society the book focuses on the work the photographs do for the movement as they politically garner attention and create discursive places historically unsettle seemingly fixed narratives about the african american past and virtually establish room for digital activist debate based on azoulay s event of photography and rancière s politics of aesthetics it builds the theory of an attentive reading of photography and addresses the larger frameworks of photography as event in anti racist considerations in their political aesthetic and performative dimensions these photographs negotiate the current matter of black lives in the united states and articulate ontological dimensions of blackness as political struggle and affirmative position they become mobile and material discursive places that lift the protested debates into wider fields of consideration and visibility complicating notions of society politics and interaction

in film blackness michael boyce gillespie shifts the ways we think about black film treating it not as a category a genre or strictly a representation of the black experience but as a visual negotiation between film as art and the discursivity of race gillespie challenges expectations that black film can or should represent the reality of black life or provide answers to social problems instead he frames black film alongside literature music art photography and new media treating it as an

interdisciplinary form that enacts black visual and expressive culture gillespie discusses the racial grotesque in ralph bakshi's coonskin 1975 black performativity in wendell b harris jr's chameleon street 1989 blackness and noir in bill duke's deep cover 1992 and how place and desire impact blackness in barry jenkins's medicine for melancholy 2008 considering how each film represents a distinct conception of the relationship between race and cinema gillespie recasts the idea of black film and poses new paradigms for genre narrative aesthetics historiography and intertextuality

technologies re abstract trauma in complex ways approaching trauma in its cultural forms this book considers how technologies of trauma in the guise of cultural artefacts presents moral and ethical challenges from the vernacular of storytelling and witnessing to livestreaming of terror today

this book is a collection of reflective experiences that challenge dominant academic canons and amplify underrepresented voices using testimonios and critical methodologies contributors decolonize knowledge and reimagine curricula through self empowerment and social change

black ephemera explores the crisis and the challenge of the black musical archive in a moment when black american culture has become a global import yet the cultural dna of that culture is becoming obscured in the transformation from analog to digital

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in black bodies white gold anna arabindan kesson uses cotton a commodity central to the slave trade and colonialism as a focus for new interpretations of the way art commerce and colonialism were intertwined in the nineteenth century atlantic

world in doing so arabindan kesson models an art historical approach that makes the histories of the black diaspora central to nineteenth century cultural production she traces the emergence of a speculative vision that informs perceptions of blackness in which artistic renderings of cotton as both commodity and material became inexorably tied to the monetary value of black bodies from the production and representation of negro cloth the textile worn by enslaved plantation workers to depictions of black sharecroppers in photographs and paintings arabindan kesson demonstrates that visuality was the mechanism through which blackness and cotton became equated as resources for extraction in addition to interrogating the work of nineteenth century artists she engages with contemporary artists such as hank willis thomas lubaina himid and yinka shonibare cbe ra who contend with the commercial and imperial processes shaping constructions of blackness and meanings of labor

compelling and troubling colorful and dark black figures served as the quintessential image of difference in nineteenth century european art the essays in this volume further the investigation of constructions of blackness during this period this collection marks a phase in the scholarship on images of blacks that moves beyond undifferentiated binaries like negative and positive that fail to reveal complexities contradictions and ambiguities essays that cover the late eighteenth through the early twentieth century explore the visuality of blackness in anti slavery imagery black women in orientalist art race and beauty in fin de siecle photography the french brand of blackface minstrelsy and a set of little known images of an african model by edvard munch in spite of the difficulty of resurrecting black lives in nineteenth century europe one essay chronicles the rare instance of an american artist of color in mid nineteenth century europe with analyses of works ranging from gericault s raft of the medusa to portraits of the american actor ira aldrige this volume provides new interpretations of nineteenth century representations of blacks

latin blackness in parisian visual culture 1852 1932 examines an understudied visual language used to portray latin

americans in mid 19th to early 20th century parisian popular visual media the term latinize is introduced to connect france s early 19th century endeavors to create latin america an expansion of the french empire into the latin language based spanish and portuguese americas to its perception of this population latin american elites traveler to paris in the 1840s from their newly independent nations were denigrated in representations rather than depicted as equals in a developing global economy darkened skin etched onto images of latin americans of european descent mitigated their ability to claim the privileges of their ancestral heritage whitened skin among other codes imposed on turn of the 20th century black latin americans in paris tempered their blackness and rendered them relatively assimilatable compared to colonial africans blacks from the caribbean and african americans after identifying mid to late 19th century latinizing codes the study focuses on shifts in latinizing visuality between 1890 1933 in three case studies the depictions of popular cuban circus entertainer chocolat representations of panamanian world bantamweight champion boxer alfonso teofilo brown and paintings of black uruguayan executed by pedro figari a uruguayan artist during his residence in paris between 1925 1933

creating a far reaching and original dialogue between cultural theory and visual practice the fact of blackness is the first study published in the visual culture arena to examine the contemporary legacy of the psychoanalyst political philosopher and writer frantz fanon in the work of leading multicultural arts practitioners and critical writers the rich insights that emerge from this collection explain why frantz fanon s seminal texts of the 1950s and 60s the wretched of the earth and black skin white masks have reemerged at the forefront of postcolonial studies

picture freedom provides a unique and nuanced interpretation of nineteenth century african american life and culture focusing on visuality print culture and an examination of the parlor cobb has fashioned a book like none other convincingly demonstrating how whites and blacks reimagined racial identity and belonging in the early republic erica armstrong dunbar author of a fragile freedom african american women and emancipation in the antebellum city
